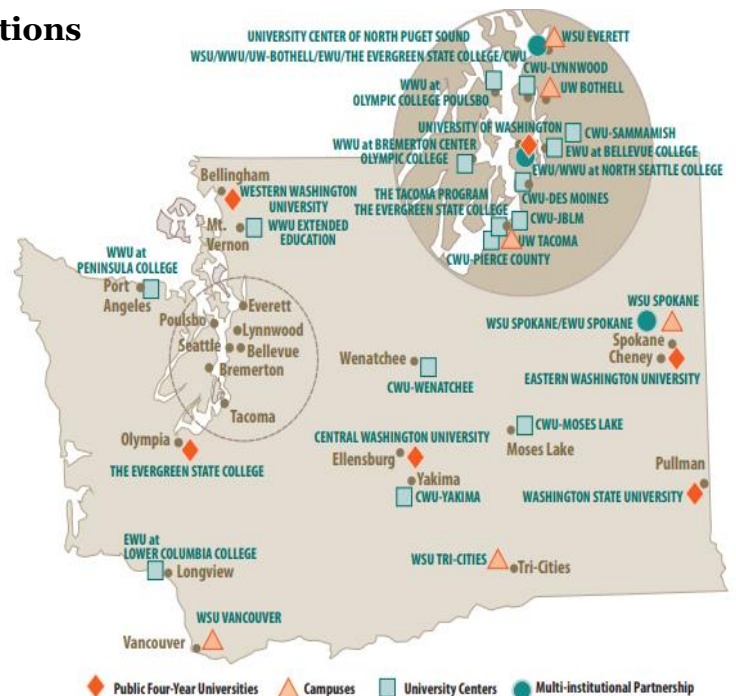
Mission and Commitment

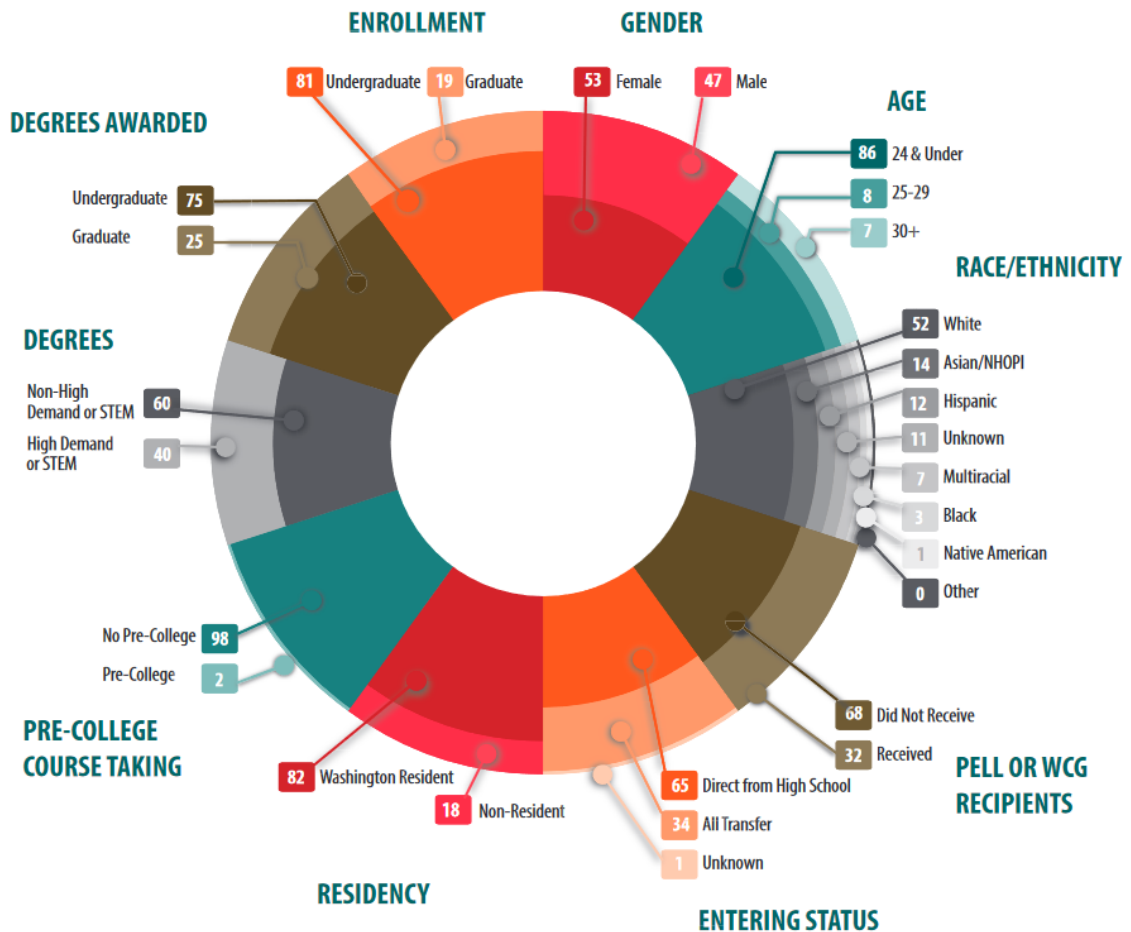

Access and Opportunities

Washington’s public four-year colleges and universities know many Washington students want to further their education after high school or transfer to a four-year college or university. Together we are committed to meeting the college and career goals of Washington’s students. We are excited to welcome Washington students who have chosen a college or university in their home state. We also want students who have yet to decide where they will enroll—or are re-thinking or just now making their college plans—to consider the terrific options available right in front of them.

Earn a Baccalaureate Degree or Higher

Washington’s public baccalaureate institutions are the largest provider of the state’s bachelor’s degrees. The sector offers a rich and diverse selection of pathways to quality bachelor and graduate and professional degree completion.

Two- to Four-Year Transfer Opportunities

Washington’s public four-year college and universities rank 2nd in the nation for the percentage of transfer students who begin at a community or technical college and earn a bachelor’s degree.

Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics and High Demand

Washington's public four-year college and universities are committed to serving the science, technology, engineering and mathematics education goals of Washingtonians and high demand areas of the state's economy. In 2018-19, Washington's public baccalaureate institutions awarded 8,466 undergraduate STEM degrees.

Liberal Arts

The liberal arts represent multiple fields, including humanities, social sciences, mathematics, and natural sciences including science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) fields. Sixty-seven percent of degrees awarded in the 2018-19 academic year were in non-STEM fields. Check out our factsheet on the liberal arts for more information.

International Programs

A wide range of international study opportunities are available to students at Washington's public four-year colleges and universities. International programs allow students to integrate learning with a new cultural context. The programs are designed to offer academic, cultural and personal learning opportunities in a structured academic setting.

Online Learning

Online learning continues to be a growing educational option that enables Washingtonians to earn college credit from anywhere in the state. Online learning continues to evolve to include multiple approaches. While these programs are increasingly part of students' academic experiences, they offer opportunities especially for place-bound students and working adults.

Dual Credit Options for High School Students

Washington's public four-year college and universities collaborate and provide numerous pre-college programs and opportunities for K-12 students to help prepare them for higher education and earn credit while in high school. Dual credit is one example. Dual credit provides high school students with an opportunity for exposure, experience and preparation for college.

Admissions

Our institutions are excited to welcome Washington students to any one of our public four-year college or universities. We want Washington high school students! Washington's public four-year college and universities, on average, accept nearly two-thirds of first-time freshman applicants. Our students represent the diverse demographics of today's student. Washington high school students are our students. We pledge to serve all students, now and in the future, with a commitment to identifying and reducing equity and opportunity gaps.

Our institutional admissions processes consider the whole student, meaning that institutions look at grades, courses – both the type and the level at which taken - and assessments in the context of the student's school along with other information to make an admissions decision. We also welcome students of all backgrounds and experiences, including students who are looking to return to school to update their skills or retool for the labor market.

Beginning in fall 2021, all Washington public four-year institutions will be permanently SAT and ACT test optional. Students will not be disadvantaged during the admission process nor will student eligibility for institutional supported scholarships, course placement or admissions to Honors programs be impacted due to the absence of SAT or ACT standardized test scores.

Washington Public Four-Year College and University Facts

- **The State's Largest Provider of bachelor's Degrees.** Demand for workers with postsecondary credentials is higher than it has ever been. According to a recent survey, 96% of high school students in the south King County region want to go to college to pursue a fulfilling career; 72% of students specifically hope to obtain a four-year degree. Looking back on the economic recovery from the Great Recession, out of the 11.6 million jobs created in the post-recession period from 2010-2016, 8.4 million or more than 72% required a bachelor's or advanced degree.
- **A Critical Role.** Offering a rich and diverse selection of pathways to quality bachelor and graduate and professional degree completion, Washington's public four-year college and universities play a critical role in higher education, the state's economy and Washington social and civic culture. In 2018-19, together, the institutions served over 140,000 students and awarded over 50,000 undergraduate and graduate degrees.
- **An Affordable Option.** Washington's public baccalaureate institutions are an affordable option. In 2018-19, Washington public four-year institutions ranked in the bottom 10 for average undergraduate tuition and fees among all states. More than one third of undergraduate students enrolled received a Pell Grant or Washington College Grant. Fifty percent of the Class of 2019 graduated from a Washington baccalaureate degree-granting institution with no student loan debt.
- **Serving an Increasingly Diverse Student Population.** Forty-eight percent of students in 2018-19 identified as students of color. Fifteen percent of students were 25 years old or older. Over a third of students received the Pell or Washington College Grant.
- **Strong Commitment to Degree Completion.** Washington's public four-year college and universities rank in the top 10 for best five- and six-year graduation rates and in the top 20 for four-year in the nation. The average length of time is four years to complete a bachelor's degree for students who directly enroll in a Washington public baccalaureate institution from high school.
- **Value Added.** The bachelor's degrees or higher earned by our students are associated with increased lifetime earnings, lower unemployment rates, lower incidences of poverty, better health outcomes, longer life expectancy and higher rates of civic and social engagement.
- **Dynamic Education for Current and Future Careers.** Washington's public four-year college and universities continue to actively engage in the development and review of education pathways and credentials that lead to degrees and outcomes to respond effectively to the changing demands in the workplace today and in the future.
- **Our Role in Workforce and Economic Development.** Demand for workers with postsecondary credentials is higher than it has ever been. Washington's public baccalaureate institutions are directly engaged with businesses and employers to identify knowledge and skills necessary to meet the economic needs of the state. As a sector, we partner through discipline-focused advisory groups with businesses and employers and collaborate with students to showcase skills and experience through dynamic transcripts, career advising and applied learning to simultaneously gain experience, knowledge and skills. In addition, our member institutions are major drivers of economic growth, creating prosperity and innovation in communities throughout Washington.

Ensuring College & Career Readiness via a robust High School & Beyond Plan (HSBP)

With roughly *2/3 of jobs in today's economy necessitating post-high school education or training*, and COVID impacts causing many students to question their future plans, all students need access to personalized career and college exploration opportunities. Staff can use the HSBP to help students see connections between their learning and future aspirations, including further education or training and/or career preparation via community and technical colleges or universities, apprenticeships, industry certification programs, and military or on-the-job training.

Recent legislation [House Bill 1599 (2019), Senate Bill 6141 (2020) and HB1121 (2021)] has amplified the importance of providing this annual exploration, advising, planning and preparation process.

From HB1599, Washington's updated graduation requirements include:

- districts must adopt an Academic Acceleration policy *by the 2021-22 school year*
 - ❖ course decisions must be made in alignment with their HSBP (see [RCW 28A.320.195](#))
- evidence that all students receive information about *state and federal financial aid* programs
- **all 10th grade students must update their HSBP**, using their statewide assessment scores, transcript and other pertinent data or information to *inform junior year course decisions*
- students with Individualized Education Program (IEP) services **must develop a HSBP aligned with their IEP Transition Plan**, and in a *similar manner and with similar staff* as their gen. ed. peers
- all districts must provide access to an *electronic platform* for the HSBP (see [Bulletin 041-20](#))
- complete a **Graduation Pathway** that is aligned with their HSBP (see pg. 2 for details)

From SB6141, a Financial Aid Advising Day (FAAD) requirement: (see RCW [28A.300.815](#))

- districts must notify and provide an annual FAAD for seniors and families *by Dec. 1*
- the HSBP must inform students about the **Washington College Grant** (former State Need Grant)
- a new WA financial aid calculator should be demonstrated to families during the FAAD

From HB1121, new Graduation Requirement Emergency Waiver (GREW)

At the time of this update submission, the State Board of Education (SBE) had adopted DRAFT emergency waiver rules for the Class of 2022 that would still allow eligible students to waive the graduation pathway and up to 2.0 credits, but only 1.0 credit per core subject area. The HSBP must still be completed according to [RCW 28A.230.090](#) and be aligned with how students demonstrate their postsecondary preparation in order to access a GREW. Go to the SBE's [Emergency Waiver Program webpage](#) to ensure understanding of their final rules for the 2022 GREW.

Graduation Pathways

HB1599 (2019) officially expanded the ways in which students can demonstrate their preparation for a meaningful first step after high school. Building off the legislature's intention that every student receive a robust career & college exploration and planning process (the HSBP) and quality instruction, completing a **graduation pathway** is intended to signify to postsecondary education/training institutions and employers a student's readiness for that next step.

Graduation Pathways available to the Class of 2022:

Career/Technical Field = CTE Course Sequence

- Complete a sequence of 2.0 or more total credits that either includes a dual credit course or leads to an industry recognized credential (IRC)
 - ❖ students do not have to actually *earn* college credit or an IRC while in high school
- Complete a Core Plus program

Military Career Interest = ASVAB Exam (AFQT Section only)

- Score for Class of 2022 = 31
 - ❖ Check the State Board of Education website by September 1 for annually updated score

Postsecondary Education = English Language Arts (ELA) and Math Courses and Exams

(Can use any combination of the ELA and math options listed in this section.)

- ACT (ELA = 14; math = 16) or SAT (ELA = 410; math = 430)
 - The SAT's ELA score remains the same with writing; the essay is no longer required
- Dual credit courses (1.0 credit total for ELA and/or math):
 - AP/IB/Cambridge: Earn a C+ (each term) in state-approved course
 - CTE Dual Credit: must earn high school ELA and/or math credit; local approval
 - College in the High School or Running Start courses: local approval
- Dual credit exams (for state-approved courses):
 - AP = 3+
 - Cambridge = E
 - IB = 4+
- State assessments:
 - Smarter Balanced: ELA = 2548; math = 2595
 - WA-AIM: ELA = 104; math = 103
- Transition courses (1.0 credit total for ELA and/or math):
(Passing course results in placement into a college-level course)
 - Bridge to College courses have state-level approval
 - Local articulation agreement between districts and sponsoring colleges

Important Note:

The GREW can be used to waive students' Graduation Pathway, but only if they can still "demonstrate postsecondary preparation" for the post-HS goal in their HSBP.

Other Relevant 2021 Legislative Session Updates

- HB1302 – freshmen are now eligible to take College in the High School courses and schools must inform students/families about related fees, financial assistance and the transcription of earned college credits
- HB1176 – prohibits the withholding of transcripts or grades as a means to recoup fees for property damage
- SB5030 – requires districts to develop a transition plan that results in the implementation of comprehensive school counseling programs aligned with national and state standards for best practice (OSPI’s guidance is due out by 12.1.21)

Other Relevant OSPI Updates

- OSPI’s 2021-24 [Strategic Goals](#) (#2) include the following focus on increasing access to postsecondary options that will prepare our students for their future goals:

- **Seal of Biliteracy** ~ the requirement for students to have met standard on the SBA in ELA was removed so now students can be considered as having met the ELA standard by meeting any of the Graduation Pathway options!
 - There is also work happening to broaden the number of languages in which students can demonstrate their proficiency, and increase access to exams in rural areas, thus providing a broader group of students with more opportunities to meet their World Language requirement for four-year college admissions.
- Starting *September 2021*, any statewide **CTE Equivalency courses** offered in a district or at a skill center must be offered for academic credit. This can help students meet their credit and graduation pathway requirements while also meeting college admissions standards.
 - Districts with 2000 or more students must provide access to at least one statewide CTE equivalency course.
- In the **state budget** for *2022-23*, all schools (K-12) that qualify as “high poverty” will receive an additional .5 FTE for more school counselor support.

Dual Credit Options

Running Start

Running Start allows 11th and 12th grade students to take college courses at Washington's 34 community and technical colleges. Students earn high school and college credits for these courses. Running Start students and their families do not pay tuition for up to 15 college credits, based on combined college and high school FTE of up to 1.2 FTE. Students pay mandatory fees, books, and transportation. Some colleges have grants and waivers to help students with these expenses. Check with the college for details.

Students interested in Running Start may get more information from their high school counseling office or from the Running Start coordinator at their local college. Many colleges offer orientation sessions to help students and families learn more about the program. The entire catalog of courses is available to Running Start students. This includes electives, vocational, online, and advanced course work.

College in the High School

College in the High School programs provide college-level academic courses to 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grade students. Courses are taught at the high school by high school teachers with college curriculum, college textbooks, and oversight by college faculty and staff.

- Students pay fees, but typically far less than regular college tuition.
- Students may also pay for textbooks.
- Located at the high school.

CTE Dual Credit

CTE Dual Credit allows high school students to earn college credit in their high school career and technical education (CTE) classes without leaving their high school campus. CTE Dual Credit used to be called Tech Prep.

- Tuition free.
- Located at the high school.
- Credits apply only to [professional-technical certificates or degrees](#).

Applied Baccalaureate Degrees

An applied baccalaureate (applied bachelor's) degree builds on the education and training from a two-year technical associate degree, allowing graduates to move up the educational and professional ladder without starting over.

Degree Options

Most community and technical colleges offer a variety of applied bachelor's degrees.

Applied Baccalaureate Tuition

Tuition rates are roughly double the cost of regular community and technical college credits.

University and College Transfer

More and more students get started on a bachelor's degree with an associate transfer degree. Students get a high quality undergraduate experience and save money by starting at a community or technical college and transferring to a Washington four-year college, branch campus, university center, or applied baccalaureate program.

Associate transfer degrees

Several options are available, so students should work closely with an advisor to choose the right degree and classes for their educational and career goals. Students should contact the four-year college or university of their choice to fully understand and meet degree requirements before transferring.

University Centers and Transfer Partnerships

Students can earn an associate transfer degree at a community or technical college and then stay on campus to complete a bachelor's degree from one of our many four-year college or university partners. Options are subject to change.

High School Diploma Options

Community and technical colleges offer three ways to earn a high school diploma.

1. Earn an associate degree through Running Start, request high school diploma from college
2. Earn an associate degree, request high school diploma from college (may require financial aid)
3. Earn a high school diploma from the college through one of the following high school completion programs (may require financial aid)

I-BEST

Washington's nationally renowned Integrated Basic Education and Skills Training program (I-BEST) uses a team-teaching approach to combine adult education classes with regular, credit-bearing academic or job training classes so students get through school and into jobs faster.

Project I-DEA

With I-DEA, English language learners who face the largest language gaps are learning English quickly and in practical ways.

Like I-BEST, this project uses an integrated, team-teaching approach so students learn English in tandem with job skills and life skills. Classes are "flipped": Students learn basic words and ideas online and cement their knowledge in class with the aid of instructors and peers. Computers and 24-hour internet access allow students to learn topics that matter most to them, anytime, anywhere.

Competency-based education

Many adult education courses are competency-based; students move through adult education into pre-college (remedial) or college-level courses based on knowledge gained rather than time spent in a classroom. Students move as quickly through courses as their competencies take them.

High School Equivalency (HSE)

Many people who did not finish high school have the same knowledge and skills as those who did graduate. By taking and passing a series of HSE tests, adults can demonstrate they have acquired the same level of knowledge. Washington state uses the four-part GED® tests for its HSE test.

Most colleges and employers accept an HSE credential as being equivalent to a high school diploma. SBCTC oversees the HSE testing program for the State of Washington. Those who meet the eligibility requirements may take the HSE tests at official test centers located throughout the state. You can find a local test center through the GED® Testing Service.

High School+

High School+ is a competency-based high school diploma offered at Washington's community and technical colleges for adults who are at least 18 years old. Advisors look at transcripts and knowledge gained from life experience, and work with students to craft an educational plan to fill gaps. To receive a diploma, students must demonstrate competency in reading, writing, and math in the context of science, history, government, occupational studies, and digital literacy.

Sports and Recreation

Community colleges provide a variety of enrichment activities and programs, including intercollegiate athletics. Sports include basketball, baseball, cross country, golf, softball, soccer, tennis, track and field, volleyball and wrestling. Recognizing the time commitment of student-athletes, colleges may fund tuition Grants-in-Aid through scholarships of up to 40 percent of tuition costs. Multicultural/Diversity and Student Leadership

The multicultural/diversity and student leadership offices on our college campuses work to create an environment that welcomes everyone, encourages civic engagement and student involvement, and provides opportunities for student success. They offer events, programs, and spaces that promote understanding, celebrate diversity, and honor different points of view. Their commitment to diversity, social justice, and multiculturalism has earned prestigious awards across the state.

Disability Student Services

Campus disability support service offices ensure equal access to educational programs and services by providing consultation on accommodations (e.g. placement testing, classroom, assistive technology) for students with disabilities who are otherwise qualified for college.

The rights of students with disabilities are different in college from what they were in high school. It is important for high school students and their parents to plan appropriately for their students' transitions to post-secondary institutions. Compared to services at public schools, the services provided by post-secondary institutions may seem minimal.

To be eligible for disability-related services, students must have a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Under the ADA and Section 504, a person has a disability if he or she has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities (walking, standing, seeing,

speaking, hearing, sitting, breathing, and taking care of oneself).

Financial Aid

Community and technical colleges award federal, state, college-based grants, and work-study based on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and Washington Application for State Financial Aid (WASFA).

Financial aid deadlines vary. Check with the college of your choice for priority dates. We encourage students to apply early.

Colleges widely recommend students planning to attend fall quarter 2021 adhere to the timeline set for College Bound students (February 1).

Those planning to attend winter or spring 2023 should also apply for aid by spring 2022.

Scholarships

A variety of scholarships may be available from each college based on financial need, program of study or major, academic merit, leadership or community service. Many colleges offer scholarships through their foundations or list scholarships at their websites.

Most deadlines for fall 2022 scholarships for graduating high school seniors offered by community and technical college foundations will be in February, March and April 2022.

Tuition Waivers

Certain populations are eligible for full or partial reduction of tuition. Tuition waivers vary by campus, so check with college registration offices.

Some examples: Oregon border county residents, military veterans, senior citizens, active duty military/Washington National Guard, children of deceased or disabled law enforcement officers and firefighters, families of fallen soldiers and families of disabled veterans, basic education.

About the Washington Student Achievement Council

The Washington Student Achievement Council (WSAC) is a nine-member council supported by a cabinet-level state agency. The Council's mission is to advance educational opportunities and attainment in Washington. In pursuit of that mission, the Council:

- Leads statewide strategic planning to improve educational coordination and transitions.
- Supports Washingtonians through the administration of financial aid, two college savings plans, and support services.
- Advocates for the economic, social, and civic benefits of postsecondary education.

What's New in 2021-2022

Washington College Grant

The Washington College Grant reached full expansion in 2020-21 with the new Pathway for Apprenticeship program. The eligibility thresholds increased, and funds are guaranteed to all eligible students and apprenticeship participants. Eligible students may receive up to 15 quarters/10 semesters or the equivalent.

College Bound Scholarship – Auto-enrollment

Effective retroactively to the 2019-20 academic year, all public school free-and-reduced-price lunch eligible 7th, 8th and newly eligible 9th graders will be auto-enrolled in the College Bound Scholarship. WSAC will work with OSPI to auto-enroll eligible students. School districts and schools should provide contact information for eligible students via the WSAC portal and help notify students of this opportunity in partnership with WSAC.

Student Loan Education Course

The new Student Loan Education Course provides a series of learning modules with information on applying for aid, comparing award letters, knowing how much aid a student needs, and repayment topics with four tracks:

- Preparing for school
- Understanding my loans
- Loan repayment
- Supporting my child's education

Residency

It is now easier for undocumented students and others to meet residency requirements for in-state tuition and state aid. To qualify, students must:

- Earn a high school diploma, GED, or diploma equivalent from anywhere in the United States before their first term.
- Live in Washington for at least 12 consecutive months immediately before their first term.
- Sign an affidavit saying they meet the above requirements. Students who are not a US citizen, national, or permanent resident will also commit to applying for U.S. permanent residency when eligible.

Aim Higher Washington

This application is available to students who are not eligible to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) due to immigration status, defaulted federal loans, or other issues with federal aid. Students who complete the WASFA will be considered for state financial aid programs only.

GEAR UP

gearup.wa.gov

GEAR UP (Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) is a federally funded program that provides high poverty school districts with resources to support them in preparing students for postsecondary options. WSAC, Central Washington University, Washington State University, University of Washington and the Highline School District lead GEAR UP programs serving over 45,000 students in 76 school districts. The WSAC-led program serves over 5,500 students in 26 school districts. WSAC maintains a website of free resources available to schools, students, and families, including family newsletter templates, college visit resources, a scholarship listing, and more. There is also a page focused on COVID-related updates and resources.



12th Year Campaign

The 12th Year Campaign provides free trainings, materials, and other resources to those working with students on admissions and financial aid applications. College Savings Programs

GET

The Guaranteed Education Tuition (GET) 529 College Savings Program offers Washington residents a secure way to plan and save for higher education. As a prepaid 529 program, GET guarantees that accounts will keep pace with in-state tuition increases. 100 GET units will always equal one year of tuition and state-mandated fees at Washington's highest price public university.



Accounts grow tax-deferred and remain tax-free when used for qualified education expenses – tuition, fees, room & board, books, supplies and more. GET units can even be used for trade school, apprenticeships, or to in some cases pay down existing student loans. The GET open enrollment period is November–May each year.

DreamAhead

The DreamAhead 529 College Investment Plan is open to anyone in the United States and offers investment-based college savings options. DreamAhead investors can customize their saving portfolios based on their risk tolerance and student age. Like GET, growth on DreamAhead investments are not federally taxed when used to pay qualified education expenses.

Need-based financial aid programs

College Bound Scholarship

The College Bound Scholarship is an early commitment of state financial aid to cover tuition at public rates, some fees, and a small book allowance at over 65 eligible Washington postsecondary institution.



This commitment is mostly fulfilled by the Washington College Grant. The application is a two-step process. After being auto-enrolled in 7th, 8th, or in some cases, 9th grade, high school students must fulfill program pledge requirements and meet residency and income requirements. Students must enroll within one year of high school graduation and receive four academic years' worth of funds to be used within five years of high school graduation.

Passport to Careers Program

This program offers two pathways for foster youth and unaccompanied homeless youth seeking a postsecondary degree or career training.

The Passport to College program helps students successfully attend a postsecondary institution by providing a college scholarship and comprehensive support.



The Passport to Apprenticeship Opportunities program helps students with career-related training under state approved apprenticeship or pre-apprenticeship programs. Support services and financial aid are provided through ANEW.

The Washington College Grant (formerly the State Need Grant) provides need-based financial aid to Washington students pursuing postsecondary education and access to funding for registered and approved apprenticeship programs. Students who meet eligibility requirements¹ can use the financial aid at Washington's eligible institutions², including public two- and four-year colleges and universities, and many accredited private/independent colleges, universities, and career schools in the state. In addition, participants may receive Washington College Grant funding for approved apprenticeship programs available through approved apprenticeship program providers.



In 2021-22, the eligibility thresholds have increased³ and funds are guaranteed to all eligible students and apprenticeship participants, making the Washington College Grant one of the most generous financial aid programs in the country.

State Work Study is financial aid for low- and middle-income students. Qualifying students get an approved on- or off-campus job to support their education. Work study builds students' skills, increases their earnings, and reduces reliance on student loans. The state contributes to the wages of work study employees, so participating employers benefit from educated and motivated workers at a lower cost.

Merit-based financial aid programs

American Indian Endowed Scholarship

The American Indian Endowed Scholarship program provides educational scholarships on a competitive basis to high-achieving, financially needy resident students who have close social and cultural ties to an American Indian tribe or community within the state. Recipients demonstrate academic merit and a commitment to serve the American Indian communities in Washington.

Workforce programs

Educator Workforce Programs

The Washington State Educator Workforce Program provides financial aid to attract and retain teachers to work in subjects or locations of high need known as shortage areas. The program includes options for current teachers, student teachers, paraprofessionals, and non-educators hoping to move into the teaching field. There are conditional scholarships that require teaching service in a public school in exchange for the scholarship funds and one grant that is awarded to applicants with the most financial need who are student teaching at Title I public common schools.

National Guard Grant

The National Guard Grant helps eligible, actively participating members of the Washington National Guard get an undergraduate degree or certificate. The program provides education opportunities to qualified service members and serves as an incentive to extend their National Guard service. Participants commit to serving one year in the Washington National Guard in exchange for each year of grant funding. Combined with state and federal aid, grants can cover tuition and fees at approved colleges in Washington, as well as a portion of books and materials.

Dual Credit

Washington College Grant Maximum Usage Standard & Dual Credit

wsac.wa.gov/college-credit-high-school

The Washington College Grant (WCG) has a maximum usage standard of 15 quarters/10 semesters or equivalent. The timeframe only applies to the quarters in which a student received the WCG. Because dual credit students cannot receive state financial aid to pay for college credits earned through dual credit, no course work taken in dual credit programs will apply to the WCG maximum usage timeframe⁴. Additionally, students

⁴ Once a student completes their BA/BS, they are no longer eligible to receive the WCG, even if they had not utilized the fulltime limits. College credits earned through dual credit programs may be applied to BA/BS degrees.

who earn an associate degree through dual credit programs can use WCG toward another associate degree, as long as they are enrolled in an aid-eligible program.

Maximum usage timeframes differ for state, federal, and institutional financial aid. Dual credit participation may still affect a student's access to financial aid, depending on the type of aid. Students who get close to the maximum timeframe will need to work closely with the financial aid representative at their college/university to maintain eligibility for federal and institutional aid. This issue is most likely to occur for students who graduate high school with a high number of college credits. Colleges and universities also typically include credits earned in dual-credit programs to evaluate satisfactory academic progress (SAP) when determining financial aid eligibility.

College-Admissions and Transfers

Transfers

Washington's public community and technical colleges offer transfer associate degrees that make it easier for students to transfer to bachelor's programs in Washington. These degrees transfer to all public and most private four-year colleges and universities.

There are three different transfer associate degrees:

- Direct Transfer Agreement (DTA) Associate Degree: Meets most lower division general education requirements at four-year colleges and universities
- Associate of Science – Transfer (AS-T) Degree: For students who want to earn a bachelor's degree in engineering or science
- Major Related Programs (MRPs): DTA and AS-T plans that prepare students for bachelor's degrees in specific majors such as business, nursing, and computer science

Once admitted to a participating bachelor's degree program, students who complete transfer degrees can generally expect 90 transferrable quarter credits and junior class standing.

College Admissions

Washington colleges have different admission policies, and some are more selective than others. Public community and technical colleges have an open-admission policy. WSAC works with partners in K-12 and higher education to set minimum admission standards for the state's public baccalaureate schools.

Minimum Admission Standards Policy Update

WSAC and partners conducted a comprehensive review of The Admission Standards Policy in spring 2021. The review was focused on the status of the temporary COVID-19 emergency revisions for AYs 2020-21 and 2021-22, related policy emerging from the 2021 legislative session, opportunities for increased student flexibility, strengthening clarity and guidance within the policy, and potential prospects for additional research and reporting.

RTC is consistently ranked as one of the top two-year colleges in the country. RTC's completion rate of 66 percent is the highest in the state, and the job placement rate is 82 percent. More than 60 percent of students identify as students of color.

RTC is in the second year of a five-year, \$1 million grant to implement Guided Pathways, designed to create educational and career tracks to remove barriers and help students finish faster.

The college offers short- and long-term career training in Advanced Manufacturing, Business, Culinary Arts, Health and Human Services, Information Technology and Transportation Technology, as well as college transfer options.

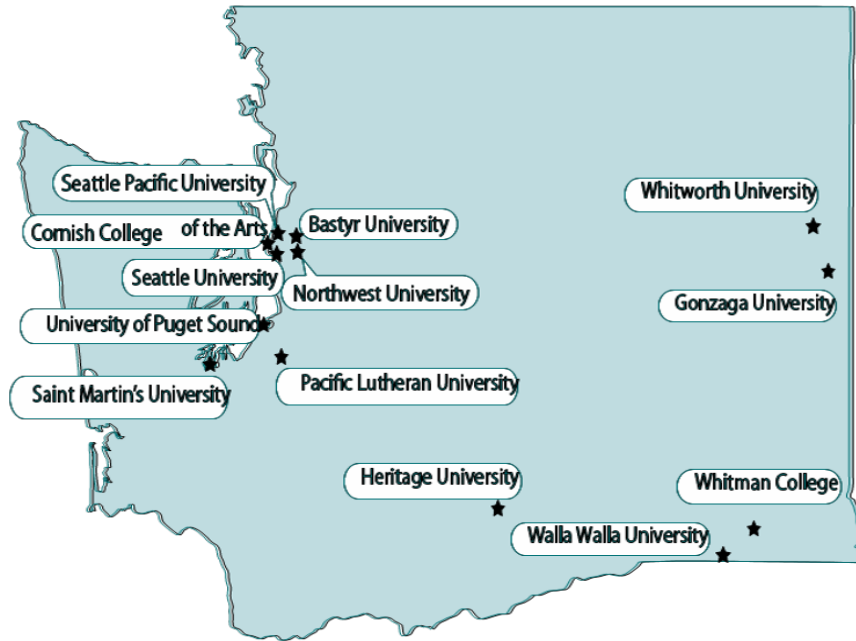

Gonzaga University does not require an SAT or ACT. Students applying without a test have the same access to everything: admission, automatic merit scholarships, special scholarships, Honors, and direct admission to nursing and engineering. No additional information is required.

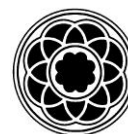

Biology, Chemistry & Biochemistry: applicants must complete 4 units of college-prep math, laboratory biology and chemistry (preferably with B grades or higher). If test scores are submitted, have scores of 570+ on the SAT Math or 24 or higher on the ACT Math section.

All applicants are considered for academic merit scholarships ranging from \$15,000 to \$30,000 per year. Talent Scholarships are available in Music, Theater, Art, and Debate. Puget Sound offers two scholarships that cover the full cost of tuition, room, and board: the Lillis Foundation Scholarship and the Matelich Scholarship. Running Start

Puget Sound accepts the Washington State Direct Transfer Agreement, and awards college credit earned while in dual credit programs such as Running Start and College in the High School. Applicants should apply as first-year students, not as transfers.

AP/IB Exam credits

Puget Sound generally accepts a score of 4 or higher on AP exams and 5 or higher on IB exams. A maximum of 16 units (2 years) of credit can be awarded.
