### Winter ICRC Meeting 2025 Legislative Session Update

#### **Overview**

The 2025-27 biennial legislative session convened on January 13, 2025. The session is in Week 4 of a 105-day session. The session is scheduled to adjourn on April 27, 2025.

#### **Key Deadlines**

\*Please note bills deemed necessary to implement the budget (NTIB) are not required to meet the deadlines.

- February 21: All bills must move from the policy committee of their respective chamber of origin to either the fiscal committee or floor of their respective chamber.
- February 28: All bills must move from the fiscal committee of their respective chamber of origin to the floor of their respective chamber.
- March 12: All bills must have moved from their respective chamber to the opposite chamber.
- April 2: All bills must move from the policy committee of the opposite chamber of origin to either the fiscal committee or floor of the opposite chamber.
- April 8: All bills must move from the fiscal committee of the opposite chamber of origin to the floor of the opposite chamber.
- April 16: All bills, unless deemed necessary to implement the budget (NTIB), must have moved from the opposite chamber to the Governor's desk.

If a student wants to go to college, is thinking of college, or has not yet considered college, there is a place for them in Washington to achieve their dreams, receive an education, earn a degree, and follow their passion. Together, we are committed to serving all students by identifying and reducing gaps among student populations.

#### **Postsecondary Policy and Engagement**

### Joint Transfer Council Finalizes 2024 Computer Science Direct Transfer Agreement/Major Related Programs (DTA/MRP)

The Joint Transfer Council finalized the approval and implementation of the 2024 Computer Science Direct Transfer Agreement/Major Related Program (DTA/MRP). This collaborative effort represents a significant step forward in streamlining the transfer pathway for students pursuing a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree in computer science, enhancing academic alignment, and addressing workforce demands in this rapidly evolving field. This decision underscores our commitment to creating seamless, transparent transfer pathways in the State of Washington. To ensure a smooth transition for students and institutions, the 2024 Computer Science DTA/MRP will be effective September 1, 2025. The 2016 Computer Science DTA/MRP will be effective September 1, 2025. The 2016 Computer Science DTA/MRP and the Computer Science AS-T Track 2 will be eliminated as of September 1, 2027. We commend the institutional representatives who have engaged in the revision of the current degree over the last two years. The 2024 Computer Science DTA/MRP degree reflects our collective commitment to streamline transfer in Washington and increase transparency and clarity for our students. #### Apprenticeship and Higher Education Coordinating Committee

In 2022, the legislature directed the <u>Ruckelshaus Center</u>, through WSAC, over a five year period (2022-2027) to: (1) carry out research, evaluation, consultation with interested parties as a collaborative process, and reporting to develop opportunities for apprentices to receive credit toward higher education degrees; and (2) make recommendations to the legislature on a sustainable funding model for apprenticeship. Building on the <u>Year 1 report</u>, the committee has met throughout 2024 to build the foundation for collaboration and engagement in Years 3 and 4. Over the last year, the committee has engaged around:

- Evaluation of paths to credentials for apprentices
- Examination of national best practices in delivery and award of educational credentials to apprentices
- Research focused on apprentices' demand for degrees in Washington
- Review of the current funding model for apprentices within the community and technical college system
- Identification of barriers for apprentices to access the Washington Grant.

A summary of this work and the next steps will be shared in the Year 2 report later this fall.

#### AP Seminar and Research and Admission

This fall high school counselors asked for clarity from our sector regarding the alignment of AP Research and AP Seminar and the courses required for minimum admission standards. Both courses are skill-based courses that compliment students' subject work as they prepare for college. On behalf of the institutions, COP developed a statement regarding the history of the courses, their alignment with minimum admission standards and impacts for students in the admission process. The statement is in the link above. Over the fall and through additional conversations with The College Board and district partners, we learned that a specific and unique course was developed by The College Board: AP Seminar English. Our sector is currently in the process of receiving materials from The College Board to review this course and consider how AP Seminar English may be applied to minimum admission standards.

#### COP Releases SB 5048 CiHS Report

In 2023, the legislature enacted <u>RCW 28B.10.058</u> to remove costs for students and families for public high school students, as defined in <u>RCW 28A.150.010</u>. The statute requires public universities and colleges to report information about the students taking these courses. This includes demographic data about the students enrolled, geographic data about the courses offered, data about participation rates and the amount of high school and college credit awarded, and whether students enroll in college after high school. #### College in the High School (CiHS) State Review

In November, the CiHS State Review Committee completed the 2024 review cycle for College in the High School programs offered in Washington. A list of CiHS programs <u>can be found here</u>.

#### Dual Credit FAQs

Each year, K-12 and higher education partner to update the dual credit FAQs. The <u>latest dual credit FAQs</u> for Running Start, CiHS, and AP/IB/Cambridge can be found on the COP website.

#### The College Board 2024 Annual AP State Agency Meeting

In December, COP joined SBCTC at the 2024 Annual AP State Agency Meeting in New York along with representatives from 23 other states. The College Board presented updates on new AP courses and programs, expanding access to AP, data, and best practices. COP will be sharing information from the meeting with institutions.

#### COP Releases SB 5227 Diversity Report

In 2021, the legislature passed E2SSB 5227, an act related to diversity, equity, inclusion, and antiracism training and assessments at institutions of higher education. The bill required institutions to report on campus climate starting in 2022. This year, <u>RCW 28B.10.151</u> requires a biennial report that provides information on professional development programs implemented by our institutions and a summary of the results from the campus climate assessments. The final report for Washington's public four-year universities <u>can be found here</u>.

#### COP Releases HB 2513 Report

Washington's public four-year institutions finalized the 2024 report regarding transcript and registration hold in accordance with <u>RCW 28B.10.293</u> and <u>RCW 28B.10.294</u>. The statute requires our sector to report each institution's policy on when transcript and registration holds are used, including the time frames and amounts for which holds are to be used and the lowest amount for which an institution assigns a debt to a third-party collection agency; the number of official transcripts and registration privileges being withheld by each institution; and the number of past-due accounts assigned to third-party collection agencies. #### **Credential Transparency**

In December, the Washington Workforce Board convened the Credential Transparency Work Group. The credential transparency work is a part of the Board's strategic workforce plan, <u>Talent and Prosperity for All</u> (TAP). COP is joined by representatives from WSU and EWU to represent our sector in this work. This initial meeting focused on identifying the challenges in Washington and the value of credential transparency. See the presentation linked above.

#### JOINT TRANSFER COUNCIL Fall Meeting Executive Summary

#### **Computer Science DTA/MRP**

JTC approved the 2024 Computer Science DTA/MRP. JTC confirmed the degree replaces the 2016 Computer Science DTA/MRP and eliminates the Computer Science Track of the AS-T Track 2. JTC also approved that by fall 2027, community and technical colleges need to have processed the change (elimination of computer science AS-T Track 2 and 2016 Computer Science DTA/MRP). The 2024 Computer Science degree is effective Fall 2025.

- Faculty concerns about course enrollment impacts
- Discussion of "credit-less requirements" like interdisciplinary requirements
- Impact assessment on MRPs needed

# Equity Requirements & Course Articulation

### Ongoing Work:

- Development of shared definition for community college diversity/equity course outcomes
- Exploration of streamlined articulation process

### Challenges:

- Multiple different requirements across 4-year institutions
- Concerns about federal funding impacts on DEI-related courses
- Difficulty in aligning outcomes across institutions

The Washington Student Experience Survey (WSES) considers food insecurity, housing insecurity and homelessness. The rate of students reporting food insecurity is 14 percent higher than in the last WSES in 2022, while the overall rates of housing insecurity and homelessness remain high.

- Of the 11,320 students who participated, 52 percent reported at least one form of insecurity:
- 2 in 5 students surveyed (44 percent) reported experiencing food insecurity in the prior 30 days.
- 1 in 3 students surveyed (34 percent) reported experiencing housing insecurity in the last 12 months, with 1 in 10 (11 percent) having experienced homelessness.
- Students who experienced homelessness (88 percent) or foster care (84 percent) in high school reported insecurity at especially high rates. Among race/ethnicity groups, American Indian/Alaska Native (82 percent) and Pacific Islander/Native Hawaiian (64 percent) students experience the highest rates of insecurity.

### The report also reveals the following:

- 76 percent of parenting students reported struggling to afford needed childcare. 68 percent of parenting students reported experiencing insecurity.
- Students reporting inadequate access to mental health care services is 32 percent higher than in 2022.
- Of students experiencing insecurity, only 53 percent are accessing public basic needs resources, and 41 percent are accessing campus basic needs resources.
